### Whither the weather?

As we approach St Swithin's day on 15 July, when the old wives' tale has it that if it rains on that day, it will rain for the next forty days, you might ask, well, what is new?? We have had quite a poor June but according to Paul Simons, who writes the weather column in The Times, it hardly compares to 75 years ago. The D-Day invasion of June 6 1944 was almost blown off course by stormy weather and then conditions grew worse. Vast amounts of supplies had to be shipped to Normandy for the Allied forces. However, a furious storm blew up from 19 to 22 June, which destroyed about 800 landing craft and ships. Supplies were landed using two Mulberry harbours, which were enormous floating structures built from prefabricated caissons, towed across the Channel and assembled on the coast of Normandy. They were built to withstand force 6 gales, but the weather of 19 to 22 June gusted to force 8, destroying one harbour and damaging the one at Gold beach but it was repaired.



You can still see some of the remains of the giant caissons at Arromanches in Normandy, but some of them were put to good use after the war ended, first to reinforce the harbour at Portland in Dorset, and then, when the Netherlands was devastated by a catastrophic North Sea storm surge in January 1953, many of the caissons were shipped from Portland to repair Dutch flood defences. This is not a bad record of their use, as they were originally designed to work for only three months!

During TV coverage of the recent ceremonies to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of D-Day, you may have caught sight of some of the caissons still poking up through the waves. And you may also have seen the splendid statue unveiled at Vers sur Mer to commemorate the British D-Day heroes. When we remember the events of 1944, perhaps we shouldn't complain too much about our recent spell of poor weather.

## The Vicar's Letter

For me, as the summer months spread out in front of us one of the great treats is finding time to watch, or more likely, listen to the wealth of sport which surrounds us. Whether it is Wimbledon, which will just getting underway as you read this letter, or the cricket moving from the World Cup to the Ashes, or the British Open, or the Tour de France, or the British Grand Prix. All these sporting riches to enjoy, and we aren't even in a year with a major summer Football tournament, a British and Irish Lions tour, or Olympic games.

When we watch sport we rightly marvel at individual brilliance. But I get more enjoyment out of watching great team sports, where the training and discipline of eleven or thirteen or fifteen individuals creates something which is greater than the sum of its parts. We see that particularly when a team of supposedly inferior players triumphs over a collection of more talented individuals who do not know how to be a team.

St Paul, when writing to the Church in Rome, recognised the value that comes when we are greater than the sum of our parts. Talking to the earliest Christians, just learning what it meant to be a community following Jesus Christ, Paul reminds them that they need to grow into being greater than the sum of their parts. Using the image of a body, he says:

*For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another.*

As with a great sporting team, the Church – the body of Christ – is called to learn to respect and rejoice in all the differing gifts we have to share one with another. This is a challenging task and one which the Church of today very often fails at. But we keep trying, like a great sports team, to be greater than the sum of our parts. And as we live in a more complex, seemingly more divided nation, we could do worse than remember the wisdom of the sports team and the wisdom of the body of Christ; that we will grow and flourish together as we learn to rejoice in the gifts and abilities of all and become greater than the sum of our parts.

#### **Plastics**

The BBC's '*War on Plastic with Hugh and Anita*' is a real call to arms and well worth catching on iPlayer if you've missed it. They've

highlighted the UK's broken recycling system which dumps mountains of 'recyclable' plastic waste in Malaysia and the disconnect between multinational companies' sustainability promises and their practices. The series has also included lots of suggestions for steps we can all take to reduce our consumption of single use plastic – taking our own containers to deli counters, making our own vinegar based bathroom cleaning liquid, and wiping wet-wipes off our shopping lists are just some of the ideas. During July STS members will be noting which Haltwhistle shops and takeaways offer alternatives to plastic and polystyrene point-of-sale packaging – do get in touch to let us know which of your favourite shops are joining the war on plastic. We also plan to start signing cafes and other businesses up to the National Refill scheme as part of a coordinated 'Water Refill along the Wall' initiative.

### **Energy**

Research into the practicality of extracting heat from water deep underground in abandoned mines is being led by Dr. Charlotte Adams at Durham University. The STS Energy group is keen to find out if this is a technology that could be employed by any of the new developments currently being considered for Haltwhistle.
