Parish Newsletter – May 2018

The Venerable Bede, monk and scholar

St Bede - also known as the Venerable Bede - is widely regarded as the greatest of all the Anglo-Saxon scholars. He wrote around 40 books mainly dealing with theology and history. He was probably born in Monkton, Durham. Nothing is known of his family background. At the age of seven he was entrusted to the care of Benedict Biscop, who in 674 AD had founded the monastery of St Peter at Wearmouth. In 682 AD Bede moved to the monastery at Jarrow, surviving the plague when he was fourteen. By the age of 19 he had become a deacon and was promoted to priest at 30. Although he travelled to other monasteries, he spent the rest of his life at Jarrow. His scholarship covered a huge range of subjects, including commentaries on the bible, observations of nature, music and poetry. His most famous work, which is a key source for the understanding of early British history and the arrival of Christianity, is 'The Ecclesiastical History of the English People' which was completed in 731 AD. It is the first work of history in which the AD system of dating is used. He is regarded as one of the greatest teachers and writers of the Middle Ages. Bede died in his cell at the monastery in May 735 AD. In 1899, Pope Leo XIII declared him to be a Doctor of the Church, the only native of Great Britain to achieve this honour. His tomb, in the Galilee Chapel in Durham Cathedral, is pictured above. His Saints Day is May 25th.

Letter from the Vicar - The Reverend Dr Benjamin Carter

In the chancel of St Cuthbert's Haydon Bridge there is a stained-glass window of the Ascension. In it a serene long-haired Jesus is floating in mid-air blessing his disciples who are looking on in silent awe. A couple of years ago I was with a primary school group in Church and I asked did anyone know what was going on in this picture. One bright child put up their hand and asked: 'are they throwing him in the air?!'

The child's answer reminds us of one of the problems we have as we come to the feast of the Ascension, which we mark on Thursday 10 May. Coming as it does forty days after Easter, Ascension Day marks that moment when Jesus, after blessing his disciples 'was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of sight' (Acts 1:9). Christian art has often focused on this part of the Ascension story, with wonderful paintings showing a pair of feet poking out from a cloud to capture that moment just before Jesus passed out of sight for the last time.

There is, however, a problem with this focus – it makes this seem like this is the end of the story. Ascension Day can all too easily become the biblical equivalent of Jesus riding off into the sunset at the end of the film. But Jesus is clear that this is not the end, but the beginning of something new: 'you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses...to the ends of the earth' (Acts 1:8). Ascension Day is not the end, but the beginning of the charge God makes to us all to continue Jesus' work on earth. Waiting for the day of Pentecost (on Sunday 20 May) we prepare ourselves to step forward into the life and work that Jesus has set before us.

On Thursday 10 May we will be marking Ascension Day with a Eucharist at Beltingham at 6pm followed by drinks. That will be a wonderful evening led by The Very Rev'd Michael Sadgrove, Dean Emeritus of Durham. But it will also be a stepping off point into the opportunities we all have to know more about the Good News that God sets before us in Jesus, as we continue to live faithfully as his followers in these Parishes by the Wall.
