The Venerable Bede, monk and scholar

St Bede - also known as the Venerable Bede - is widely regarded as the greatest of all the Anglo-Saxon scholars. He wrote around 40 books mainly dealing with theology and history. He was probably born in Monkton, Durham. Nothing is known of his family background. At the age of seven he was entrusted to the care of Benedict Biscop, who in 674 AD had founded the monastery of St Peter at Wearmouth. In 682 AD Bede moved to the monastery at Jarrow, surviving the plague when he was fourteen. By the age of 19 he had become a deacon and was promoted to priest at 30. Although he travelled to other monasteries, he spent the rest of his life at Jarrow.

His scholarship covered a huge range of subjects, including commentaries on the bible, observations of nature, music and poetry. His most famous work, which is a key source for the understanding of early British history and the arrival of Christianity, is 'The Ecclesiastical History of the English People' which was completed in 731 AD. It is the first work of history in which the AD system of dating is used. He is regarded as one of the greatest teachers and writers of the Middle Ages.

Bede died in his cell at the monastery in May 735 AD. In 1899, Pope Leo XIII declared him to be a Doctor of the Church, the only native of Great Britain to achieve this honour. His tomb in Durham Cathedral, in the Galilee Chapel, is pictured. His Saints Day is May 25th.

Letter from the Vicar - The Reverend Dr Benjamin Carter

Through the weeks after Easter we spend time blinking in the brilliant light of what God has done for us in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Like the first Christians we spend time trying to come to terms with what this extraordinary act means for us and our lives. One of the chief ways through which we do this is by spending time with those stories we have in the Gospels of Jesus appearing to his disciples after his resurrection.

Perhaps the most famous of these is the story of the road to Emmaus. Set on the afternoon of the first Easter, two of Jesus' disciples are walking away from Jerusalem towards the village of Emmaus. This is not a gentle stroll but a hurried walk, fearful of what will happen when the authorities discover that Jesus' body is not in the tomb in which he was laid three days earlier. On the road they meet a stranger and they tell him everything that has happened in the last few days.

Unbeknownst to them, this stranger is the risen Jesus who explains that everything God has done on that first Easter was promised through the story of scripture. Then, coming to a roadside inn, the disciples ask the stranger to eat with them. It is only there, as the stranger takes bread, blesses and breaks it, that they realise they have been in the presence of the risen Jesus all this time.

For many this story has become the archetype for our worship where we share in the story of scripture and break bread with one another. Through this, we know that when two or three are gathered Jesus is in the midst of us. But more than this, the story reminds us that the risen Lord walks with all of us through life: that in the resurrection God reaches into the graves we dig for ourselves and brings us to new life in him. We might not recognise him and we might not even acknowledge him but in the resurrection we are invited by God to know again his transforming presence with us and through his Spirit to know that Jesus is with us until the end of the age.
